The Golden Spike is easy to document with detailed pictures of the required components, so check out the application, take some qualifying pictures of your work, have a fellow NMRA member who is familiar with your layout and models witness the application and send it to your Division AP manager for forwarding. (<u>https://www.nmra.org/sites/default/</u> <u>files/2006-golden-spike.pdf</u>) You may be rewarded with a fancy certificate, golden spike lapel pin and a mounted 1:1 scale spike trophy with an engraved plaque for your efforts.

Meanwhile, if you have an inkling to present a clinic to help your fellow modelers solve a problem or want to show off your work on your layout or project, our San Diego Division has taken the initiative to implement a complete virtual program. They have been presenting Zoom meeting events since May and have invited participation both in attendance as well as presentation to all of our PSR Regions. They have openings for presenters through the balance of this year and on into 2021. 

Due to the cancelation of the 2020 PSR Convention the Orange Blossom Special is offering a reduced convention registration package.

This package will include the Welcome Reception, General Membership Meeting with Continental Breakfast, Clinics, Layout Tours, Operations, Non-Rail Activities, Hobo Auction, Saturday am Swap Meet and closing the convention with the Awards Banquet for the pre-convention price of only \$105. <u>Note:</u> This special offer is only good until September 30, 2020, after that the price goes up to \$125. Model Railroading "It's About the Journey NOT the Destination"

Over my 20 years being involved with the NMRA on many levels I have gotten to know many people in the PSR. And we all are in this great hobby for different reasons. Some of us are building our dream layouts, others belong to clubs, and some just enjoy building cars, structures, etc. Some are involved for only the social aspect and enjoy being on boards and running the organization. All of which are great reasons to belong to the NMRA and for being involved with model railroading as a hobby. And there are a few of us who have set out goal on becoming an MMR but let me caution you, that is the Destination and NOT the Journey.

The requirements for MMR are reasonably simple to complete so it will take some work, but the journey is not that complex. Here is a thumbnail of the minimum requirements.

- Author: write and have published 42 pages of articles/ photos.
- Cars: build 8 highly detailed cars, 4 must be scratch built.
- Civil: draw a plan showing various track components, in HO build a minimum of 50 LF of track with 6 different types of track of which 3 must be scratch built.
- Dispatcher: earn 50 hours of running Op's spread among several operation tasks.
- Motive Power: highly detail and build 3 locomotives 1 must be scratch built.
- Official: serve as an elected official on a regional board.
- Prototype Models: build a scene that is prototypically correct in every detail.
- Scenery: in HO build scenery of a minimum of 32 sq. ft of your layout or module.
- Structures: build 12 highly detailed structures, 6 must be scratch built.
- Volunteer: accumulate a minimum of 60-time units by volunteering to help with events, conventions or give clinics.

For MMR you must earn at least 7 from the above list and at least one from each sub category Railroad Equipment,

Railroad Settings, Construction/Operations, and Service to the hobby. And if you are aggressive you can do this in one to two years. But then the journey is OVER. So, do you then move onto a new hobby? Why not take a different approach build your railroad and as you meet the requirements of the above categories fill out the paperwork and turn it in. Just because you now have a certificate in a subject area that does not mean you can no longer build a building or car, add scenery, or change some wiring. This is a hobby that is never completed you can always add something to your layout be it a new section of track or more details.

What am I trying to say? We are in this hobby for the enjoyment it brings to us. Don't get hung up on the destination of MMR as it is only a title. Instead enjoy the journey you will take to get there, you will be glad you did. I am not saying do not go for your MMR just do not make it your priority, you will miss a lot of the journey if you do.

Editors Notes

What are you doing during the pandemic?

In this time of introspection and social distancing I thought I would offer up some thoughts on my activities over the past few months. Although my firm is still enforcing a work at home strategy in response to State and Federal mandates, I am one of those lucky ones who can work at home almost as easily as I can work in DTLA. In addition, most of my clients are healthcare clients and are seeking advice on how to cope with this pandemic.....keeping me very busy!

However, I do find, now that I have more time at home than I had previously, that I am filling time with modeling fun. In addition to doing some locomotive kitbashing, finishing a trestle module, and building locomotives for other modelers, I tasked myself with several model related activities. This keeps my spirits up and energy high.

Maintaining the Fleet

I have gone through all my locomotive and rolling stock and looked at repairs or adjustments that needed attention. This is something that we often put off as modelers, but is critical to successful operation. I even made a spreadsheet to help me keep track of when and how my locomotives have been serviced. Things like coupler heights (remember that pesky coupler that is just "Not quite right?), lubrication of all moving parts, damage repair, replacing of burnt out lights, proper car weighting, test running the loco's to ensure proper operation, adjusting CV's etc., were all part of the maintenance regimen....all minor things that I have put off for a long time. Now I can pull out any locomotive and string of cars and run them with confidence.

Identification

In addition to all the maintenance items I also went through all my locomotives and labeled the bottom of each locomotive with its correct long address for easy reference, and also placed a special identifying mark on each locomotive and piece of rolling stock. I started using these identifying marks as some years ago a friend of mine had his roster stolen and his identifying marks on the underside made identification by authorities and recovery of his property much easier.

Photography

I have also been taking the time to document my locomotives and some special rolling stock photographically. Since I do a certain amount of publication and want my Facebook page to be as professional as possible, I value high quality images of my roster. I also think these would be valuable in the event of theft, although that was not my reason for doing it. The following is a picture of the simple photo setup I use for photographing models and an image of the results. YMMV depending upon your level of equipment and photographic knowledge.

What are you working on?

This is a section of the Dispatch to share with others what projects you have been working on. You just need to provide a photo of your project and a brief description if you desire. One of the projects that has been setting on my shelf that I have been meaning to complete was a Southern Pacific caboose made from a repurposed Harriman coach.

As reference I utilizing photos and roster from Tony Thompson's Freight Cars of the Southern Pacific Volume 2: Cabooses and additional information from Jason Hill's blog Models and Kitbashes by NightOwlModeler. These cars were converted by the Southern Pacific in the early 1950's primarily for use in transfer service. These converted Harriman coach cabooses lasted in service throughout the 1950's until they could be replace with newer purchased cabooses.

This car started as an Athearn Roundhouse 60' Harriman coach chair car. Being utilized as a caboose the doors on the car were either locked open or were complete removed to allow quick ingress and egress by train employees. Therefore, the doors were cut out of both sides and ends of the model. As part of the conversion, several windows were patched over. I measured and cut styrene to fit in the appropriate opening that were closed.

On the roof I added wire conduits to simulate the electric lighting that was installed in the cars. Some of the roof top vents were removed and a smoke stack was added were a caboose stove was installed in the car. Wire roof grabs were added to both ends of the roof and grab irons installed on the ends of the car. The model has windows in the vestibule that I also closed up with styrene sheet cut to fit.

Correct Central Valley 8-foot wheel base trucks were installed to the underframe. To accommodate the clearance need for these long wheel based trucks, one of the air tanks needed to be removed and shifted over to provide swing clearance for the trucks. Since the trucks were made of metal, I soldered wire leads to provide lighting in the car for track detection purposes since the car was to be utilized as an end of train caboose.

A few of these cars were just re-stenciled and put into service, but many of these cars when converted by the Southern Pacific were repainted into their standard freight car red paint scheme. I repainted the coach caboose freight car red and then decaled with a combination of Mircoscale and Champ decals. The roof is painted black along with a wash of grimy black to simulate sun bleached and rain weathering. Trucks and underbody are lightly weathered with Pan Pastels.

Hope you enjoyed my project. Please go ahead and share yours. - James
