

# The Next Generation Of Model Railroaders

ndoubtedly, there will be a next generation of model railroaders. What we don't know is if there will be very many new model railroaders. Does this matter? I think it does matter. For me, it matters partly for selfish reasons and partly for selfless reasons.

The selfish reasons are pretty basic. More model railroaders encourages more hobby products, more hobby resources and more hobby activities. Less model railroaders means fewer of these. I prefer more.

The selfless reasons are not as simple, but deep down we all can relate to them.

Think about youngsters that you know who are interested model trains or some other similar hobby. Then think about those youngsters who have no apparent hobby interests. Generalizing between these two broad groups, from which would you pick to have as neighbors? As grandchildren? To do chores around your home? Probably those who have a hobby. Why? Because these young hobbyists tend to be miniature good citizens.

Does having a hobby guarantee that a youngster will grow up to be a good citizen? Of course not. But having a hobby probably helps. Youngsters with an outlet for creativity and accomplishment, with a positive focus for their leisure time, in all likelihood will become commendable adults. The adults of the next generation, and the next generation of model railroaders in the case of our hobby.

So take the time to introduce a youngster to model railroading. Show a neighbor boy or girl your layout. Explain and demonstrate some basic hobby skills. Give them a simple kit to build and enjoy. (We all have more kits than we can build in a lifetime.) Encourage a youngster to take up the hobby. Do it for selfish reasons.

here were many subjects discussed during the BOT Meeting at St. Paul. I will attempt to touch on the high points.

Management's new Y2K Plan will streamline the organization, provide more responsiveness to the mission statement, be responsive to member issues and concerns and provide fulfillment of 501c(3) responsibilities

This plan completely reorganizes all of the Departments of the NMRA as we know them today. The new Departments are as follows: Adminstration, Convention, Development, Education, Financial, MAP (Marketing, Advertising, Public Relations), Membership Services, Publications, Records, Howell Day Museum, Kalmbach Library, and Technical.

The head of each department will be known as a Director and the leaders of subcategories will be known as Managers. There will be advertisements in the Bulletin to solicit people to fill vacancies created by the reorganization. This is your chance to volunteer to work at the national level. This plan will not be put into effect until after midyear, as there are several motions that have to be taken care of to bring the By-Laws and Policy Manual in to line.

Budget for 2000. A balanced budget was presented to the BOT for approval. There were two income items that were removed from the budget by the BOT, leaving a loss of +/- \$14,000. Suggestions were made to Management as to ways to make up this income loss. They took the suggestions under advisement. Due to the postage increase of 1 cent in 1999 for first class postage and an impending postal increase of 2 cents in 2000 for first class postage, along with a bulk rate increase, plus a utilities increase for the Chattanooga area, the cost of doing business has increased considerably.

As a result, management has requested a dues increase of \$2.00 to take effect as soon after the Midyear Meeting as possible. No one likes a dues increase, as we all know, and the BOT has insisted that dues increases be made in small increments when needed. The BOT has voted its approval, with a proviso that management do everything it can between now and the Midyear to raise

the money in a different way. A second vote will take place at the Midyear. A CPA was hired to set up computer accounting systems for the NMRA as a non-profit corporation. These procedures have been set up and are now in use.

Due to Office Manager Sharon Gaston leaving, we now have a **new Office Manager**, Keli Crew. She will be on board by August 15th.

Modeling with The Masters — Clark Kooning. The first program took place in Chattanooga and was a huge success. There were 28 attending. Everyone in attendance was very pleased with the instruction and accommodations. "GOOD JOB CLARK." They are looking for MMRs, as well as Regions, that would like to participate in the program. Please contact Clark Kooning (address in the NMRA Bulletin).

Member retention has been a problem, we have lost +/- 800 members over the last year. We all need to look within ourselves to find a solution. Invite a past member to the next meet or to your club for the next meeting. Best of all, invite a past member to your house to just talk railroad. Go to coffee with them and even go to the Hobby Shop some evening. It is up to us as regular members to seek out and communicate with these railroaders. If we can bring just one ex-member back within the fold, our membership would be increased ten fold. Remember, this must take place at the grass roots level, it can't all be done at the national.



Whit was the creator of the Alturas and Lone Pine model railroad which was noted in "Along the Line looks back" section of the March 1999 Model Railroader.

He held several offices in the NMRA including president in 1968 and 1969. He also received several awards from the NMRA including Honorary Life Member, Distinguished Service Award, and two Presidents Awards. Whit was probably best known to the NMRA membership as the Editor of the NMRA Bulletin from 1970 to 1979.

He was the author of numerous articles on all phases in the hobby including many on model railroad operation.


He will be greatly missed by all who knew him well.



There will be an exhibit by a group of Operation SIG members. Friday night will be a live auction — be sure to bring items you'd like to auction off. There are tours of Wisconsin Tissue and Ralston-Purina Co. There will be layouts open in the Flagstaff area. There are several hobby shops in Flagstaff, too. And of course, the model and photography contests, awards banquet, and a Sunday morning membership meeting. There are a number of places of interest in Flagstaff to see on your own as well.

One of the Railette activities will be a "cookie exchange". Those Railettes planning to attend are requested to bring 2 dozen cookies of their favorite recipe as well as the recipe written down. There will be cards available to copy your favorite recipes onto. Bring more than one kind if you wish!

### 1. Model and Prototype Fire Equipment - David Greenberg

Railroads and municipalities both use fire-fighting equipment. David, who writes and provides photographs for the magazine Fire Apparatus Journal, shows modern fire apparatus from many different cities and discusses HO models available. David has some great photographs



of very unusual' paint schemes on fire fighting

equipment.

2. United Verde & Pacific: Then and Now - Phil Pict For over 20 years, the United Verde Copper Company ran a first class common carrier operation connecting Jerome Junction (Chino Valley) with Jerome. The 23mile line passed over rugged, beautiful terrain and was built to bring in mining supplies and bring out copper matte. For many years the UV&P was Jerome's only convenient connection with the outside world. This clinic shows photos of the operation as it existed around the mm of the century and compares those sites with existing terrain. It is an excellent modeling choice with its narrow gauge connecting to a standard gauge (Santa Fe), rugged terrain, quaint equipment, and a huge multi-level depot and yard in Jerome.

### 3. Railroad Watches - John Gruber

### 4. Operation Lifesaver and Other Railroad Safety Issues - David Agee (BNSF Railroad)

Operation Lifesaver is a safety awareness program about railroad crossing accidents. Grade crossing accidents have been demonstrated in cities all over the United States, including Surprise, Arizona several years ago. This clinic also discusses other safety aspects about railroads. A video will be shown and handouts provided.

#### 5. Soldering Made Easy - Richard Dick and Don Stewart

Soldering is the essence of electrical connections. Poor soldering results in poor electrical flow and inoperative equipment. Richard and Don will discuss solder, soldering irons and some simple techniques for strong, conductive solder joints.

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#### 6. Moving Military Vehicles by Rail - Don Stewart

The railroads have been used by the militaries of the world to move their heavy vehicles since the 1800s. In the United States this started in the Civil War. Don discusses the military use of railroads to move military vehicles over the years and concludes with slides of modem military trains. A handout summarizing the clinic will be provided.

#### 7. Maintenance of Way Equipment - Ken Rhoads

Proper maintenance of the rail lines is critical to the smooth flow of trains and thus the profitability of any railroad. Ken shows many of the unusual machines that are used to maintain the railroad's right-of-way.

#### 8. Signal Placement - Barry Draper

Where does the railroad place signal equipment? Why are they located there? Barry will answer these and more railroad signal questions.

#### 9. Southwest Forest Industries - John Lovely

Southwest Forest Industries was a logging operation in Flagstaff, Arizona. They operated a railroad to log the forests that extended south from Flagstaff. John discusses the railroad, its operations and the remnants, which includes two locomotives.

#### 10. Logging Trestles - Bob Moore

What you see on most model railroads is not what you see in the woods. Very few railroads used large trestles to ford streams

and gullies. Simple trestles were usually constructed of logs cut within a short distance of the need.

# 11. Moving Southwest Forest Industries 2-6-6-2 - Jim Johnston

Southwest Forest Industries 2-6-6-2 steam locomotive was moved from the Coconino County Fairgrounds to a location in Northern Flagstaff. Jim was there to capture the move with his camera. It is an interesting story.

### 12. Track Laying for Quiet, Derailment Free Operation - Udo Meyer and Don Stewart

Modelers want to lay track quickly to "get the trains running" using flexible track sections. A little extra time laying the flex track will pay off in an excellent visual effect, and quiet trouble-free operation for many years to come. Udo and Don show how they laid track rapidly while ensuring trouble free operations for years to come on the South Mountain & Golden Sunrise Railroad.

# 13. History and Archaeology of the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad - Richard Dick

The El Paso & Southwestern Railroad ran from El Paso, Texas to Tucson Arizona. The Southern Pacific, and now Union Pacific, still uses parts of the line and a large bridge just south of Tucson.

# 14. Obtaining Custom Cars for yourself or your club - Roger von Seeburg

Roger headed an effort to obtain custom decorated cars for the 50th anniversary of the Thunderbird Model Railroad Club. If you are contemplating ordering custom cars for yourself or your club, this clinic will provide the information you need to successfully complete your project.

#### 15. Reversing Loops - Huebe Huebenthal

Huebe will present three electrical solutions to reversing loops. The first and most simple circuit is essentially automatic in its operation. The only thing the operator must do is reverse the powerpack while the train is in

equipment to make sure the train has no problems and the third circuit is designed for a reversing loop where the entrance and exit loop are not the same turnout.

# 16. Glue as a Tool - John Determan

Glue can be used to connect many different materials together. Certain glues work best on certain materials. John will discuss the best glue for the job.

### 17. Denver Area Prototypes- Phil Hanna

PSR Convention - flagstall

The Denver & Rio Grande Western, Union Pacific, Santa Fe, CB&Q (and The BN) all had yards in Denver in the 60s and 70s. Phil has photographs of the colorful diesel power used at the time in the Denver area.

### 20. Arizona Mineral Belt Railroad - John Lovely

In 1880 the Atlantic and Pacific Railroad started laying tracks west from Albuquerque. It reached Flagstaff in 1882 but was predated by the Arizona Mineral Belt railroad. It is this little logging railroad with grand ideas that we will pursue in this clinic as we trace some of its ghost routes through the forests south of Flagstaff. There will be plenty of challenging prototypes of road bed construction to keep even the most ambitious prototype modeler busy.
