





"The Vice President shall assume the duties of the President in his absence and assist him in carrying out the duties assigned to him. In the event of death or resignation of the president, he shall...assume the duties of the President until such a vacancy is filled."

Pretty obvious stuff. But more to the point, the real responsibility of these positions is to promote the purpose of the PSR. And the purpose of the PSR, simply put, is to further the enjoyment of the hobby of model railroading.

Yes, there are occasional meetings. Yes, there is a budget to manage. But beyond the meetings and the budget, as an elected official you and your crew of officials and volunteers will help to further the enjoyment of the hobby of model railroading. That's the payback and that's what makes it satisfying and worthwhile.

If you believe you can further the enjoyment of the hobby of model railroading, if you truly want to further the enjoyment of the hobby of model railroading, then you should become a candidate for one of these offices.





The creation of the Education Department is one area of focus. In addition to being necessary for documentation, it provides an avenue to share ideas and perhaps bear fruit for implementation.






# **PSR - NMRA Trustee Election**


