#### Arizona Division's March Meet

Sixty-one (61) people attended the Arizona Division's Spring Meet held on Saturday, March 13, 2004. Three new members were signed up. Registrants were charged \$5.00 to attend and youths \$2.50. Entrance was free if you joined at the time of registration. The Meet provided 3 clinics, a full slate of contests, Railette activities, a swap meet and an informational meeting. Lots of attendees stated that they enjoyed the day (8:30 AM to 4:30 PM).

Three clinics were presented on various subjects. These were all interesting and well attended.

§ John Determan discussed the finer points of brush painting those modeling details. Lots of information on the care of paintbrushes.

§ Paul Chandler gave an excellent clinic on reworking turnouts for better operation. Essentially he solders the points to the frog rails, then isolates the frog and powers it separately. This virtually eliminates opens, shorts and derailments at the turnouts.

§ Tom George presented his "Scratchbuilding a la Carte" clinic he first gave at the 2003 Regional Convention. He discussed many different modeling materials and building methods.

A full slate of contests was held and included Construction (Kit and Open), Photographic, Favorite Model and Favorite Train categories. First place Construction contest winners receive a small plaque and all other contests get ribbons for first place.

The Construction Category was broken into Motive Power, Rolling Stock, and Structures in both Kit and Open categories, the difference being the Kit category can only earn 1/2 of the scratchbuilt points. This Kit category was established to give those who super-detail kits an opportunity to compete evenly with scratchbuilders or kitbashers as they usually only have a few scratchbuilt parts. A total of four Merit Awards were won in the Construction contests. Excellent work by these modelers.

§ Motive Power was a hot contest with 5 entries (3 in Open and 2 in Kit). Alex Dirks took Best of Show with a Conrail Diesel he extensively kitbashed. It was a beauty that earned a merit award. In the Open category, Alex took first with another Conrail Dash 9 Diesel (also a merit award), Paul Chandler took second with a nicely worked over SP RSD locomotive, and Tom George took third with his

San Diego Division activities since the last report have mainly concentrated on our Winter Meet and monthly layout tours. The Winter Meet included our customary potluck meal, door prizes, model contest, and clinic. However the clinic was a bit unusual. We decided to offer 5 clinics wrapped up in one. It was an experiment in fast and dirty scenery construction - a brief description is at the end of this article.

Among the layout tours, we visited Art Dominy's HO layout in February, Nelson Rath's O scale empire in March, and four layouts in Orange County in April. Art Dominy and his son have created a mountainous motif in their "Deboise Western RR" (De Boys — get it?). This Layout features twisting mountain vistas, crack passenger service, and plenty of visual interest and bustling scenes along the right of way.

Nelson Rath has created heavy O scale coal drags behind giant articulated's. You can actually feel them rumble by. Overhead, an HO (and HOn3) layout traverses most of the 20 by 45 foot dedicated outbuilding. This is topped by an even higher G scale line which operates on a looping selftimer.

Although somewhat dampened by April showers, the four layouts visited in April included those of Bob Chaparro, Mike Kresen, Bill Flynn and Jim Landcaster. This was a joint tour with the Cajon Division, and was a lot of fun for all who went.

Meanwhile, initial plans have been activated to prepare for the PSR convention which we anticipate hosting in 2006.

#### Quick and Dirty Scenery Clinic

Each participant was given a 2" thick, square foot foam block as a starting point. With a hot glue gun, quick set plaster, and fast drying acrylic paint, each person moved from one scenery station to the next. First station was creating a road using styrene sheet which was painted and then cut on the diagonal. With a simple swipe with a flat slotted screw driver along a straight edge, road stripes and cross walks were quickly and accurately represented. Modelers then moved to another station where they learned how to cast rocks and add color variations. Then they stacked and pinned (with tooth picks) even more randomly shaped foam chunks onto a corner, smothered it with more Continued on page 6

The NMRA Mid Year Board of Directors Meeting was held in Cincinnati, OH February 19th thru 22nd, 2004, with many subjects being discussed. The minutes will be published in a future NMRA<sup>®</sup> *Bulletin*. Some of the highlights were as follows.

1. VP John Roberts reported that a new telephone system has been installed at NMRA® HQ (the old system suffered lightning damage and had to be replaced, it was covered by insurance).

2. The Calendar Project is in full swing with the expectation of being even better than before. Need photos sent to the Library (ATTN. Brent). There will be an article calling for photos, that will be appearing in "SCALE RAILS" within the next three or four months. GET THOSE PHOTOS IN!

3. The clinic book for Seattle is well under way. Anyone wishing a copy of the latest book project, "Track and Railway Maintenance", should send your order to HQ. The next book project will be a collection of freight car photos. This could easily be more than one or two volumes. Look for Christmas delivery.

4. The JCP Program is now under the direction of our own Jan Westcott – Dick Flock will run the event and report to Jan.

5. Since the Toronto Convention the Howell Museum Committee has held meetings regards sites for the Museum. They have teamed up with the Narrow Gauge Foundation to bring strength to our quest. Sacramento looks promising, but the committee is not ruling out other sites as of yet (Downtown Chattanooga, and Strausburg, PA ) More later.

7. The Library Committee Final Report: As stated in the interim report the committee believes that the Kalmbach Memorial Library is a major asset to the NMRA® and the entire model railroad community. After conducting a survey of the NMRA® membership concerning the services of the Library, here are some of the results:

# PSR Education Department

Jan recently talked me into becoming the Education Chair of the Pacific Southwest Region. I've been an NMRA® member for a dozen years, and am active in the Southern Nevada "N-Trackers". When Jan Wescott moved up to the NMRA® Educational Chairman, she left the regional position open and somehow I fell in. As a representative of the NMRA Education Department I am here to help members better understand the programs available in the NMRA®, and to be a "font of information" and "guide members as they work their way to a better understanding of the NMRA®" as Ray Bilodeau the NMRA® Assistant Education Director says. I'm not sure what this means, but I guess that I am here to pass along things that float by from National, answer questions and be a general reference source.

I also can pass back to national and to other regions things that are happening here. Since Jan lives locally and is a member of our Region it's real easy to keep her informed about our activities, as she will probably be participating in most of them.

I want to use this column to help spotlight your great efforts in sharing the hobby. Send me your education success stories. Have you organized a "Railroading Merit Badge" class? What clinics were taught at your latest gathering? What amazing workmanship was highlighted at your last model contest? How did the public react to your exhibit at the local mall? Did someone in your Division make that extra effort that is deserving of recognition? Let me know so I can share it with everyone else.

Some new things to pass along - the NMRA® has a new PDF format Judges Scoring Sheet that will aid in judging contests. Instead of filling out paper forms and calculating scores the judges can enter information directly into a computer worksheet, print it out, and calculate and report scoring electronically. These forms are available on the NMRA® Contests web page, or you can contact me directly.

There are also three new contests and awards that will be presented at the 2004 National Convention in Seattle. They are:

\* "Mt. Albert Scale Lumber Award" sponsored by the Mt. Scale Lumber Company. This award is presented to the wood model structure obtaining the highest number points at a NMRA<sup>®</sup> Contest (construction of structure must be predominately wood).

\* "Hunterline Award" sponsored by Hunterline Productions. The sponsor will select the "Best of Show" for wood structures for presentation of this award. \* "Fantasonics Engineering Award" sponsored by Fantasonics Engineering is open to both on-line and off-line displays. The sponsor will select from these two categories the winning entry for this award. In addition to the award, Fantasonic is offering a special prize for the 2004 contest.

The special prize is a complete Scale Magic sound scene craftsman kit. This includes a CD player, a stereo amplifier, a "referenced" pair of miniature two-way speakers, and complete instructions for installing and concealing them. In addition prize also includes a dedicated Scale Magic CD soundtrack of the winner's choice and ten hours of studio time to customize the soundtrack to the specific model it is intended. Together with the complete Scale Magic sound system/track (\$300) and the studio time (\$250) this prize is valued at over \$500.

plaster and slashed and hacked at the quick setting plaster with a knife to simulate sedimentary cliffs. While still damp, four shades of earth tone acrylic colors were applied with a brush in one hand, and a spray bottle in the other to melt it all together into a convincing rock face with loose chunks providing a talus slope. From there they moved on to the foliage station. A little webbed matting on a multibranched twig covered in some green foam produced almost instant trees. Some more medium and fine foam spread along the roadside on any exposed flat surfaces brought these miniature scenes to life. A quick visit to the "Water" station with a little blue and green paint swirled on in concentric layers and some fast drying nail polish created a small pond or tiny creek. A little more foam (darker green around water, yellow and brown foam elsewhere) and the scenes were complete in less than an hour and a half. A brief contest followed the completion, but it was difficult to pick a winner. All participants had become expert scenery gurus in no time at all. Plus they got to take their creations home.

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# Modeling With The Masters

It is a hands-on approach to modeling, and <u>Advance</u> <u>registration</u> is required. The program is limited to small groups. You will receive personal instruction by an NMRA Master Model Railroader. The MWTM Clinics cover topics on an introductory basis, but include advanced techniques. Participants will learn by doing, and they will be amazed at what they can accomplish. Descriptions are listed below. <u>Building Wood Craftsman Kits #1</u>

This is an introduction to the world of wood craftsman kits. Each participant will receive a kit of a blacksmith shop which could also be used as several different structures if you wish. It will be built using board by board techniques. You will get personal instruction by NMRA Master Modelers on how to assemble, paint, and weather this interesting kit. <u>Scratchbuilding a Wood Trestle Bridge #2</u>

The Fillmore and Western Railway runs between Fillmore and Santa Paula through the fertile Santa Clara River Valley. Once it was used for growing barley, lima beans, lemons and oranges. Eventually oranges were replaced by avocados and container nurseries. Lemons seemed unaffected by the change.

The General Motors 1949 F-7, dressed in orange and silver, will probably be used on the day of our visit. Their steam engines are in the shops for repair.

The Short Line rail corridor was once used by the SP to transport agricultural products to the main line. Another line was built to the south and became the now favored route. The Short Line rail corridor, along with new restorations in Fillmore and Santa Paula, make for an enjoyable excursion.

Our tour group, arriving by chartered bus, will board the train at 11:30 a.m. with a departure at 12 Noon. There is a one hour stopover in Santa Paula and a return to Fillmore by 3 p.m. The Cafe Parlour Car is open at 11:30 a.m., and is available for lunch.

Or, you may choose to find a lunch stop in Santa Paula. A snack bar and gift shop are also on board. After a full and exciting day, we will return by bus to the hotel at 5 p.m.

The HOn3 layout depicts favorite locations in Colorado. Rails pass through Gunnison into Black Canyon, and on to Cimarron. Dawes Viaduct and Crystal Creek Bridge are modeled. <u>Pasadena Model Railroad Club</u> – "Sierra Pacific" HO, HOn3, & Traction

The Pasadena Model Railroad Club operates the Sierra Pacific Lines, one of the worlds largest HO scale operating model railroads, covering 5000 sq. ft. The railroad has over 30,000 feet of hand laid steel rail. A four track mainline allows for operating up to ten 30 ft. trains. Branch lines serve coal mines, ore and limestone mines. There is a lumber mill and logging operations. Recently a theatrical lighting system has been installed allowing trains to operate in a semiautomatically controlled 24-hour day-night sequence. It must be seen to be believed.
