

Who is "A Winner"?

When we enter a contest we all share the hope that our entry will win an award. That, somehow, our efforts will be rewarded.

However, let us consider the contest entries in a different context. Whether or not one wins that coveted sought after award or not may actually be secondary to other benefits derived from entering contests.

When a contest entry is made, the contestant is actually sharing his or her work with others. Another may find that elusive solution to a problem that he or she may have been pondering for some time, through viewing the work of others. Others may be inspired to try new methods and to become more deeply involved in our wonderful hobby.

The final result is that no matter whether your entry wins an award or not, you are a winner. You are a winner for sharing your work with others. Those who view your work are winners also, because they learn from viewing your work.

As you can see, awards aside, there are no losers in the contest room. To use an old cliché, "jump in and get your feet wet". You'll find that there is a certain level of satisfaction in sharing and in knowing that everyone wins when you enter NMRA* contests.

HINTS: Whether you are a repeat contest entrant or are a novice to the contest process, here are a few simple procedures that will enhance your entry appearance and documentation.

1. As you build or make your projects keep a running narrative of the steps used from the beginning to the completion of your project. This will assist you in filling out the required documentation for your entry.

2. Prepare your documentation prior to entering the contest room. Type your documentation if at all possible. Computers provide great diversity in preparing entry and judging forms. If you have doubts about completing the "paperwork", contact your Division or Regional Contest Chair.

3. Display your entries to their best advantage. If it is model rolling stock or motive power, use a display track. Photos should have an attractive matting, but one that does not detract from the photo subject. Arts and crafts should be displayed in appropriate frames or with backgrounds that will enhance their appearance.

The PSR Convention, in Glendale, offers you that opportunity to be a winner. It makes no difference if you

As you have (hopefully) heard or read by now, the NMRA* Membership voted approval of the new regulations, known as the Long Range Plan.

1. The Long Range Plan passed by the following vote: 2221 were cast in favor and 536 against. National and the Regions will have about fifteen months to put the regulations in place.

Article VIII, Section 10 of the Regulations provides for the establishment of the "Regional Advisory Council" (RAC) and describes its function. Each Region President is a member of the RAC. The RAC has several actions to perform over the next few months to help place the new regulations in service. The RAC organizing committee is composed of Southeast Region Trustee Bob Beaty, Lone Star Region Trustee Jim Langston, and Sunshine Region Trustee Bob Gangwish as chairman.

- 2. The Pacific Southwest Region can be very proud of its membership as it is well represented from the National down through the Region. One of our members has worked very hard and has distinguished herself at the National level to the extent that she has received the "Presidents Award" for the year 2004. Our own Jan Wescott has worked very hard reorganizing the NMRA* Education Department. This has been a major undertaking. "Congratulations Jan!", job well done!
- 3. The new President, John Roberts and the new Vice President, Mike Brestal, took office at the NMRA Annual Business Meeting on Friday at the convention.
- 4. The JCP has gone through a name change. Now known as the Junior Clinic Program, it is operated by Dick Flock, who reports to Jan Wescott. Any questions or suggestions should be directed to them. Note the JCP was run at the National Train Show only and was a great success. The booth was packed with many young people at all times.
- 5. The next couple of book projects are well underway. One project is a collection of Vintage Freight Cars. The second is a soft bound book on open loads and should be available soon. Watch Scale Rails for information.
- 6. The search goes on for a location for the Howell Day Museum. Nothing as yet, but The California *PSR DISPATCH* 3rd Quarter, 2004

Railroad Museum (Sacramento) is very interested in our being part of their expansion over the next several years.

- 7. Meetings and Trade Shows are working very hard in the procurement of site and etc. for future Conventions. In the planning are Cincinnati in 2005, Philadelphia in 2006, Detroit in 2007, Anaheim in 2008, and looking at Hartford in 2009.
- 8. The National Train Show was well received by manufacturing and vendors alike. A total of over 15,000 attended the show. There were so many new products and models to check out that it was a very busy time for all.

This will be my last report to you, the membership as my term will end in September of this year, 2004. It has been a pleasure working with everyone to further this great hobby of model railroading. With the passing of the new regulations the NMRA* has a bright future.

I wish to thank all of you for your support and assistance in making this hobby better than ever.

Several little bits of info this time. Most passed on from Jan as forwarded from the NMRA*. I'd like to thank Jan for writing most of the column this month, please, keep it up, it makes things a lot easier.

The big NMRA* news is the LRP passing and more details will be forthcoming from our PSR Trustee Bob Sherlock. By an overwhelming margin, members of the National Model Railroad Association (NMRA) have approved the organization¹s new regulations. The vote was 2,221 for and 536 against. The regulations, which replace the amended 1935 constitution and by-laws, will be implemented over the next 18 months. They are part of the NMRA*'s Long-Range Plan, which is intended to make the organization more responsive and relevant in the new century.

A "well done" to all our PSR members that participated and did well at the NMRA* Contest in Seattle. I'm sure Duane Buck, Region Contest Chair, will detail winners in his column. But special hats off to Rodger Gredvig and San Diego Division. Rodger hauled his Boy Scout modules to the convention center and these were prominently displayed in the hallway near the contest room. Really superb modeling.

Modeling with the Masters Program at the National Convention went well. Two of the sessions sold out. Clark Kooning, Program Manager, has since received many kudos for his efforts.

The experiment to host the JCP Youth program exclusively at the National Train Show went extremely well. More than 211 kids participated learning how to make trees, build cars, cut foam tunnels, airbrush and help scenic a layout. That's the Junior Clinics Program the NMRA* and the manufacturers sponsor work stations. The kids circle the various work stations making trees, experience cutting foam, air brushing, operating trains, building cars/structures and help scenic a Marklin donated layout. This year the completed layout was donated to the Mt. Ranier Boys and Girls Club. After completing the work station experiences the kids all received a gift goodie bag and tee shirt.

Congratulations to our Education Director, Jan Wescott, for receiving the NMRA® President's Award in recognition of her work with the National Education Department.

Three MMRs were awarded their certificates in Seattle and these will be profiled in *Scale Rails*. I am always impressed with the people that put in the great effort required for the MMR, including our own Ed Hall as well as several other area members.

Wow, did we ever have a load of photo and slide entries this year! Some folks tell me it goes in peaks and valleys. To me (my opinion only) it is the sign of the current times as more and more members are finding spare time scarce as evidenced by the surging popularity of Ready To Runs. In any event we had 110 model entries, 163 photo/slides, 22 Arts/Crafts and a large number of entries (25) in modular group/individual modular category. We are now working to get all of the photos of the winning entries up on the NMRA* website.

Please, send in any information on educational programs that your groups are trying out, or interested in sponsoring. I know that National is working hard on the youth program, but many groups are involving people of all ages. One way to attract people to your club is to sponsor running sessions, or learning sessions, and involve those that have never looked on model trains as a way to spend their time. Many groups, such as the "N-Trak" clubs, specialize in bringing layouts to the outside world. I was active in the San Diego "N" Scale group, which had one of the layouts at the SD Balboa Park museum. We would see dozens of people a week walk by, but did not really involve them in our activities.



I am not entrenched in old school ways of doing things and can approach this transition with a fresh, clear and open mind. I want to be a part of the change and believe I can draw from my past experiences in leadership to be an asset to the PSR. I am known to be conscientious, detailed, and organized; a person willing to take a stand if it becomes necessary. I'm not promising you a platform to change the world or move mountains. I am very aware of the responsibilities of this office and am willing to learn the ropes and give it my best shot.

John Bruce

The owner has taken his lifelong interest in multiple railroads, regions and eras and transformed these into a layout featuring a series of connected dioramas. These scenes cover widely separate geographical areas and different prototypes. The highly-detailed layout represents New England, the mid-Atlantic Northeast, Colorado, the desert Southwest, and California. Trackage is dual-gauge in some areas and even features some European prototype mainline with appropriate catenary. Located in a semi-basement area of a hillside house, the benchwork and the basic layout plan evolved around fixed elements of the room and the general method outlined in John Armstrong's *Track Planning for Realistic Operation*.

Iames de Bree

This 22' x 23' HO scale layout was begun in 2002. The layout is housed in a room built especially for the layout. The first level bench work is completed as the 165 foot mainline with much of it double tracked. A branch line is under construction that connects to a second level and will feature a very large freight yard, some industry and a large locomotive servicing facility. The scenery is ten percent complete. The layout is controlled by DCC (NCE system). Approximately 60 locomotives have been converted to DCC. It depicts a modern era with a few steam locomotives (with sound) for fan trips. The layout can run four trains at once.

Steve Dodge

This standard-gauge "G" Scale layout is the result of ten years of planning and four years of building. Steam engines, first generation diesels and rolling stock depict the 1940's and 1950's era. Heavyweight and streamlined passenger trains pass long slow freights on three scale miles of mainline running through Western plains, canyons, and mountains in this layout that cleverly integrates railroad and garden under an existing large oak. The design is a twice-folded dog bone plan with four passing sidings. The layout features long trestles and a bridge in front of a 12' waterfall.

Jim Eldridge

The 1930's era "G" Scale Goldeye Mining Company operates in an area 16' x 32' with 250 feet of track. The design is an elevated (28 inches high) island with an overlapping elevated loop. Two sidings, a fifty-foot long trestle, 2.5% grade and an embankment round out the mainline features. Track power is provided by a Crest Train Engineer system. Scenery and other construction are about two-thirds complete. Several buildings and

other features create vignettes, including a pond, a desert, a valley, and a mountain. Various ecological systems are represented, such as forest, desert and aquatic.

Dale Green

This is an outdoor version of the *Pacific Electric* in 1½ inch scale with 600 feet of track, 2½ percent grades and real cuts through the terrain. The layout features a 950 series PE street car and a model of the rare PE 1593 freight motor, formerly owned by the Red River Valley logging railroad. Both units are battery-powered, developing one horse power, and feature actual traction locomotive sounds recorded at the Orange Empire Railroad Museum.

Cliff Harwood

Housed in its own room, this layout represents the dual-gauge Carson & Colorado RR on May 26, 1960. Resulting from an imaginary rise from the ashes, the Carson & Colorado (S.P.) returns as the Nevada & California Railroad. The turntable at Laws, CA, as well as many scratchbuilt buildings are modeled from photographs. The railroad melds standard gauge with dual gauge and employs the original narrow gauge with transfer facilities at Owenyo. The main rails circle the Mammoth Lakes Basin, which is scaled down to fit the space. Currently there are 3 scale miles of standard code 100 rail including the "Round Valley" facilities track and 7/10 of a scale mile of dual-gauge, code 70. When completed, the dual-gauge will be Main #2, totaling 1 1/3 scale miles.

Michael Houston

This outdoor layout in on a table three feet off the ground. It is 45 feet long and between 5 to 6 feet wide. The track goes about 12 inches above the table (into a mountain) and below the table and forms a hidden return line. Structures include a church on a hill, cemetery, small town and a trolley line. There's an 8 foot dogleg at one end and a double-deck layout at the other. The center section is a series of switchbacks to move the train from table top to a different elevation.

Ed Lazarus

The "N" scale Greater Wilmington Authority Railroad is set in the fall of 1946. This 2 ½ x 9 foot layout is completely sceniced and has all planned structures in place, a rarity for many layouts. A major feature for this

layout is the many electronic circuits employed for automatic operation of the trains.

Gerold Merker

This is one of the few basement layouts in Southern California. Measuring 32' x 60', this "On3" layout evolved from an original "O" Standard Gauge layout and represents the D&RGW along the Alamosa to Durango segment. It is a single-deck design and completely sceniced, with hundreds of handmade trees, and beautiful backdrops painted by Ray Spencer of Disney and Slim Gauge Guild fame. There are many highly detailed mini-scenes throughout. Wireless control guides the point-to-point operations. This layout was featured in RMC (June '95) and Proto-48 Magazine.

Eric Michaelson

This hi-rail "O" Scale layout was featured in the July 2003 issue of *Classic Toy Trains*. The layout is 36' x 14' and represents the 1954 era in a Southern California setting. Filming was just completed by the PBS television series "Tracks Ahead" for inclusion in the upcoming season. The layout features many unique animations, including an "Exploding Gas Station" that must be seen to be believed.

RWL Lavout

This is a rarely seen operating "S" scale layout, four collections of vehicles and trains plus a small collection of antique bicycles. The operating layout is 16' x 32' and features hundreds of American Flyer static and operating accessories, some dating to the earliest years of this line. Four trains may be operated at one time. In addition, three custom-built locomotives operate on the layout. These are an Erie Triplex, a UP Challenger and a UP Big Boy. The layout is housed in the grand ballroom of a 1911 Pasadena mansion that was used for the exterior shots in the TV series "Benson." The mansion and grounds are impressive as is the stately neighborhood.

William Simonton

This fully sceniced layout is an "O" scale, two-rail layout depicting the Southern Pacific from the 1940's to the end of steam. There are 550 feet of mainline in a space of 20' x 48'. The layout contains many scratchbuilt and early "O" scale kit structures, some

dating to the early 1950's

Bob Smaus

This early 1950's 17' x 19' "HO" layout represents portions of the *Southern Pacific* including downtown Los Angeles and Fillmore to the North. The layout features a simple double-track folded dog bone design on a single deck. A long backdrop divides the layout into various scenes. Operations center on citrus icing, loading and distribution layout. Many articles on various design and construction techniques have been featured in the model press. The track plan and photos were in the March, 1999, *Model Railroader*

Larry Stark

The Lariat Lines represent a fictitious California short line set in the early 1930's, connecting with a major Class 1 transcontinental railroad. With 18 served industries the Lariat has a good traffic base generating sufficient cash flow to sustain itself through the Depression. The 12 x 17 railroad is located in a converted garage. It's a duck under twice around design. All track is Code 83. The 130 foot mainline has a minimum 30" radius. The track plan features hidden storage and a large fifteen foot yard. Wiring and track are approximately 90% complete. Control is traditional block wiring for 5 cab controls

Bill Topham

The "HO" scale Silver Palace Lines has appeared three times in the hobby press and is so named because it follows Southern Pacific prototype. The layout has a 216 foot single track mainline with five train-length passing sidings and two large yards. The design allows either point-to-point or continuous operation from five cabs featuring both steam and diesel power. Total trackage exceeds 580 feet. Scenery is complete.

Dan Wexler

The Hamlin & Valley Central Railway is located somewhere in California during the early 1960's with the ATSF as an operating partner. It serves produce growers in the San Benito Valley. The Hamlin & Valley Central Railway is a free-lanced HO scale railway following ATSF practices. It is housed in a finished two car 18' x 20' garage. The track plan is a point to loop configuration with approximately 300 ft. of code 100 rail. There are 53 turnouts. Digitrax DCC powers the railroad. Trains are predominantly stem powered, all of which are equipped with Soundtraxx decoders. The layout is 40% sceniced.

Al Wallace

The Goldfield & Hangtown is set in the 1890-1915 time-frame, and covers the arid terrain of Nevada to the Sierra foothills in California. The railroad links Goldfield with a Southern Pacific branch through its connection at Hangtown. Scenery includes extensive rockwork and realistic ground cover. There are many

There is a lumber mill and logging operations. Recently a theatrical lighting system has been installed allowing trains to operate in a semiautomatically controlled 24 hour day-night sequence. It must be seen to be believed.

Pomona Valley Model Railroad Club – HO Sunday, September 19, 1 pm – 4 pm.

This is a free-lance layout of the members own conception with prototypical coverage of California. It does not model any real-life particular branch or railroad, though some have come to acknowledge certain areas of importance: Walong, Tehachapi, Cajon, and Los Angeles, to name a few. The layout is about 140' x 30'.

Santa Susana Club – The Santa Susana Pacific – HO Saturday; September 18, 10 am – 4 pm. Sunday, September 19, 10 am – 4 pm.

The Santa Susana Railroad Historical Society is a group of avid model railroaders and rail fans in Southern California's Los Angeles and Ventura Counties. The Club maintains a large, all DCC, "HO" scale model railroad with over 500 feet of track. Our layout is a model of the Southern Pacific Railroad from LAUPT to Portland, Oregon. Layout Tours - Home (continued)

craftsman and scratchbuilt structures as well as a large variety of bridges, each designed for the requirements of its particular setting and traffic. Rolling stock includes many scratchbuilt wooden freight cars and craftsman Labelle passenger cars. There are several distinct mining towns with mining operations and trackage. The layout room is 20' x 25'. All visible track is handlaid, with two double-slip switches and two turntables with custombuilt indexing systems. The main line throttles are from the 1960's articles by Lynn Westcott and the yard has an exceptional pulse throttle devised by Dave Allen.

Ken Wilson

This layout is a mountain logging and mining theme railroad set in the early 1900's It features 150 foot "HO" mainline plus "HOn3" trackage and is about 50% sceniced. Track has been laid directly on a spline of solid pine roadbed. Control is achieved through cab selectors wired to thirty blocks. It is 14' x 16' and occupies 1½ bays of a three-car garage. The layout design features a cantilevered portion designed to allow an automobile to park under it. The layout is further notable because it was moved 65 miles from Palos Verdes to its present location.

Joseph Wilke

The outdoor "G" scale *Sparks Valley Junction Railroad* occupies an area 25' x 30' and has about 300' of track. It's a free-lance layout with multiple eras, featuring a variety of engines and rolling stock plus traditional block control. Most of the structures are wired for night illumination; night running will occur during the tour. Landscaping is in progress.

Ron Williams

The Rio Jolly & Western is a lot of railroad in a compact space of 4' x 8'. It is a highly detailed free lance standard gauge "HO" layout with considerable narrow gauge influence reflecting Colorado mining operations. The layout was on the 1996 National Convention tour.

Ken Williams

This HO layout represents a what-if division of the *Southern Pacific* running from Hesperia to Salt Lake City. It is a three-level design housed in a 32' x 9 ½' tandem garage. The track plan features point-to-point operation with two return loops and a staging yard. The desert scenery is about 50% complete.

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


