model railroading. In my opinion, you should never stop learning. It keeps the brain active and healthy and opens up new ideas and projects for you to enjoy. Have fun! In July, John Sigurdson gave everyone a last glimpse of this famous Dakota & Northwestern N scale empire. John has sold his N scale railroad in order to expand development of his On3 logging layout.

In August we were again hosted by the Poway Club for our annual summer picnic (in lieu of a Summer Meet) at the famous Poway Railroad Park, which included a private tour of the Engine house and newly constructed turntable. Every aspect of the restoration of equipment, even the building itself, is done with period-accurate techniques and construction methods. Later that month the Division was invited to an open house at the Balboa Park Model RR Museum to operate on any of their 5 giant layouts. They allowed our members to use their own equipment (providing it met with each club's standards).

In September, Dick Roberts allowed passage on his wonderfully detailed 1930s style HO layout featuring mushroom bench work (2-levels w/opposing view blocks), and his ingenious "elevator" that moves whole trains vertically to the upper level. Curiously, Dick is seriously considering changing to On30.

In October, we met for pie and a last look at Dave Balser's Onion Valley RR (at least, his HOn3 version). Dave is converting to On30. In fact, immediately after the layout tour, a staff member from Model Railroader magazine shot a photo layout, and demolition began!

We are already busy making plans for the 2006 PSR Convention, and as you can tell, we will have several new or completely revamped layouts on the tour.

As to the future, more mini-tours and the Fall Meet are already planned, and looking further out, preparations are being made for the "N" Scale Collector's Association to have their National Convention at the Ramada Inn here in San Diego in the summer of 2005.

For potential model entries, it is always sound practice to keep a log, or running narrative of the action taken to accomplish your modeling goal. This will assist in filling out the contest Judges' Score Sheet.



Achievement Program

At the last Regional Convention, there were few models entered in the contest. This is disappointing in several areas:

There are not as many models to view by the registrants

Ideas for construction and plans are not exchanged

Construction methods and tips used on building the models are not exchanged

Learning is decreased

This seems symptomatic of a declining interest and declining membership. I have seen it in other

organizations as well. The International Plastic Modelers Society (IPMS) is experiencing a decline in membership and has initiated a program very similar to the NMRA®'s Achievement Program. This is hoped to help invigorate the society. After all, their primary focus is building models. At the August 2004 International convention held in Phoenix, the 900 registrants entered over 2,000 models in the contests. Some of these models were magnificent! Like a 1/72 scale (only slightly larger than HO scale trains) M-1 tank with a removable engine, opening hatches and skirts and a fully detailed interior. There

were even a few model railroad

items. An excellent O scale PFE ice reefer and several HO cars were present in the miscellaneous category. Other models were very nice and some were fair. Many categories had over 30 entries and only 4 awards were given. A lot of people were excitedly discussing their construction techniques, subject matter and final finishing and presentation.

So, how does this apply to model railroaders? Anything that gets people excited about something or opens up a new area to explore generates interest and activity. Perhaps modeling has become the venue of only a few that blow away the competition.

When I had again lost a contest to the famous E. LeRoy Thompson, MMR, he reminded me that he

As you are probably all aware by now, Bob Sherlock, who served the Pacific Southwest Region for fourteen years as Trustee, has stepped down. I think that we all owe Bob our thanks for a job well done over all those years! I will be filling the Trustee position during the transition to the new Board of Directors as called out in the Long Range Plan (LRP). Consequently, my term will only last nine months, but I promise that I will represent you to the best of my ability.

Who is this guy Jacobs, you say? Well, I've been in the NMRA® since 1979 and am, I guess, a life-long model railroader-starting with Lionel many years ago. I'm from the Nevada side of the Cajon Division, where I'm the editor of the Order Board and I've now been on two PSR convention committees. I'm in HOn3, belong to the Friends of the C&TSRR, and love the RGS. I started on the refurbishment of the cab of K-36 489 this last August and now consider that my locomotive. Enough about that-just feel free to come up and talk to me at any of our get-togethers; I would like to meet each and every one of you in the very near future. But, we must go on to the serious stuff.

The implementation of the LRP is on a pretty fast track. Some significant dates reported from the last Board of Trustees meeting are as follows:

- 1. A nominating committee for candidates for the new Board of Directors has been formed and is actively working. Election of directors will take place in the spring of 2005. There will be a ballot in Scale Rails.
- 2. The new Board will be seated on June 30, 2005.
- 3. The Region Advisory Council (RAC), composed of region presidents, will be formed as soon as possible and will elect the RAC representative to the Board of Directors by March 31, 2005.
- 4. The regions must review and update their bylaws to comply with the new NMRA® regulations by September 1, 2005.
- 5. The single membership program will take effect on or after September 1, 2005.

According to President John Roberts, at the National level, the NMRA® will be run like a multimillion dollar business, which in most respects it is. The new Board of Directors will give high-level guidance, which will be be implemented by the departments. This is a departure

from the current system, where the Trustees have a more "hands on" approach. There are also fewer members of the new Board which should allow consensus building on issues to take place a little faster. What does this mean to us grass roots people? We should see nothing except for more efficiency when we deal with the national organization. After all, model railroading is supposed to be fun!


