PSR BACKSHOP

What a great time! We are just back from the NMRA National Convention and National Train Show held in Salt Lake City, Utah. It is always nice to see and spend some quality time with model train friends that we don't normally get to spend much time with, hurrying through one of our own PSR or Division conventions or meets. It was particularly relaxing in that I had no commitments at this convention, so I was able to just sit back, and enjoy the show(s).

The convention committee was particularly helpful with a couple of small registration problems and we were very pleasantly surprised by the quality of the Convention Hotel. The weather was warm (think Southern California in the summer) so what more could you ask for?

One of our first Clinics wasn't really a clinic at all but titled "Meet the President" and that we did. Pete Magoun is a very likeable and casual guy and answered everyone's questions as they came up, including a couple from yours truly. Since almost all of the National Board of Directors were present, I had a chance to discuss the 501c(3) effort (dead at National) and had a great direct discussion with Frank Koch, the head of the NMRA National Achievement Program. All of the NMRA Merit and Achievement awards are ultimately viewed and approved by Frank. I was particularly interested in the somewhat nebulous qualifications for the "Master Builder, Prototype Models" Achievement Award since I have never evaluated an application and have been asked about it recently by a couple of our members. Frank gave me some good references and, more importantly, a feel for the somewhat subjective evaluation.

Although Sandy and I did not have time to get to any of the layout tours, we did get out to Promontory to see the reenactment of the Golden Spike ceremony. They have full scale recreations of both 4-4-0's, CPs "Jupiter" and UPs #119. These engines have been built from the original engine plans right down to the type of fuel that they burn (Jupiter burns wood and smells like it, #119 burns coal and smokes like it). These engines are absolutely beautiful to look at and see operating. I liked the colors

on Jupiter, Sandy liked the wood cab and trim on #119. Unfortunately, we were not able to make it to Jim's clinic since both times he presented his clinic on Raspberry Pi's the room was completely filled with folks standing out in the hall listening to his presentation.

At the annual Awards Banquet, Don Vest from our Arizona Division was awarded the NMRA National President's award for outstanding contribution to his Division (see the August issue of the NMRA Magazine).

Pat and Mona Raymer (L.A.) joined us on our visit to the National Train Show which, as usual, was great. I know that the National Narrow Gauge show has a lot of the manufacturers and premier vendors, and I have not made it to one yet but The NMRA National has them all. All of the major suppliers are there. Meeting some of the smaller suppliers in person really gives you a chance to see their products, have them explained first hand and find out what they have coming down the line. I was particularly happy to see the "Tool Man" booth in that we have lost our tool man in our local LA, Orange County and San Diego shows. I really didn't need any tools to add to my collection but somehow ended up walking out of his booth with three bags of tools that I didn't know I needed. The layouts were great and we spent a good amount of time at the show before it was opened to the public. After the show, on a tip, we found a great little local hobby shop in Sandy City that had a good supply of train stuff.

They had one entire wall (maybe 30 feet long) with nothing but model paint from everywhere. Wow!

Since all of our PSR voting Board of Directors were present, minus one, we held our quarterly Director's meeting at the hotel and were able to move a couple of budget items along and agree on adding a couple more minor ones to it.

We are just a short few weeks away from holding our own Pacific Southwest Region "Arizona Junction" Convention in Mesa and it promises to be a really good one. The Arizona Division folks have gone over the top on advertising and even signed up some members at the National. If you haven't signed up yet take another look at the Convention web site and don't wait to the last minute to reserve your room at the convention hotel. I know that the committee has gone back for more room allocations at the reduced price but that will be cut off by the hotel at some point soon.

Bring your models to show and share, have a great time and I look forward to seeing (and meeting) you there.

As a result, when many of us share an experience, it is likely that more than one of us will report on that experience. In this case, that shared experience is the NMRA National Convention. I hope you will understand if I seem to tread a similar path to other contributors to The Dispatch.

In case you were not aware, the NMRA National Convention for 2019 was held in Salt Lake City this past July. My wife Mona and I had never been to Salt Lake City, and it was soooo close, and it's the National, so who could resist? We asked friends who had been to Salt Lake City how the weather would be in July. The universal answer: HOT! As it turned out, the weather was comfortable or at least tolerable for us. My congratulations to the Salt Lake City convention team, for taking on this huge challenge and making it all happen in such fine style!

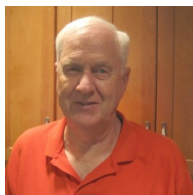

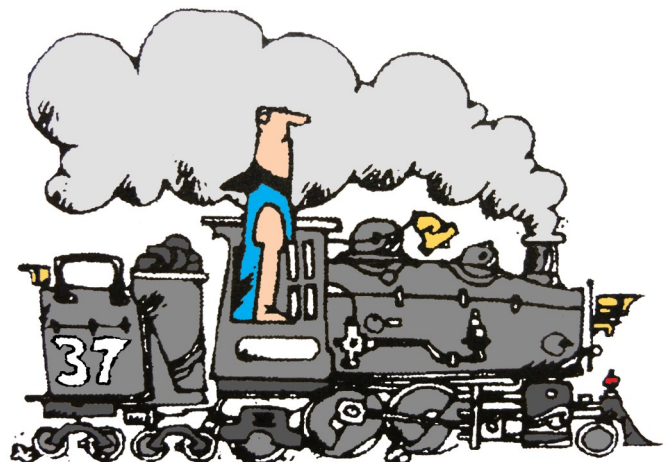
We are working on an Amtrak trip from LA to San Diego Old Town, with busses picking up the group

What I found interesting was that of the 21 awards listed above, 15 of them were judged at one event, Cajon Divisions CIM3 Meet. So, is it worth your time and effort to bring something to enter into a contest room at one of your local division events? I think the above answers that question.

I know a lot of you are still skeptical and think the paperwork is way too hard to fill out. That is the first misconception. For the Golden Spike Award, all you need to do is fill in your name, NMRA number, and exp. date, address, submission date, and Region. The evaluators fill out the rest. Your time 5 minutes, evaluators time 15 minutes. Okay that is the easy one. Next!

Merit Awards, no you do not need to write a book. If you kept good notes while building the model it is relatively easy. Tell us how you built it and what you used, this should only take an hour or two. Heck you just spent 60 or more hours building it why not get some credit for your work. It is not that hard.

Certificate paperwork again not that difficult. For Master Builder Cars, Motive Power and Structures just list the Merit Awards you received along with some other models of equal quality on the forms. This may take an hour or two of effort to fill out compared to how many hours it took to build the models.

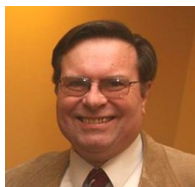
Author, Official, Volunteer are all just a matter of counting the articles you have written, and tracking time served. Yes, this may take you a year or two to complete. You just need to keep track of the time spent or articles written.

Scenery another simple one once you have spent the hundreds of hours building it. Like the Golden Spike fill out your name and other information along with a few paragraphs on how you built it and materials used, so we are looking at maybe 3 hours of time to be recognized for hundreds if not thousands of hours of work.

Civil, Electrical, and Dispatcher, yes these will take a little more effort, but then again what is a few days compared to the years you spent building the layout?

My point is you can complain about it and never get recognized for your work or spend a few hours and receive the recognition you deserve.

It's up to you.

There will be forms # 901 and # 902 available for you to fill out at the Show Room if you did not have a chance to prepare them in advance. There will also be a Clinic given at the Convention as well on how to fill out the forms along with NMRA members willing to assist you in completing the forms.

In addition, we are always willing to train you on how the NMRA Merit Evaluation is performed. This provides modeling insights into the five different categories that Evaluators look at utilizing the standardized NMRA judging matrixes. These categories are Construction, Finish and Lettering, Detail, Conformity and Scratch Building. It will give you a better understanding of what constitutes a model that meets Merit with a score of 87.5 points or more out of a possible 125 points total.

If you are just submitting entries for display or Popular Vote, you only will need to provide the Entry Form # 901.

With all the activities going on at the Convention, entry of models, photos, arts and crafts will only be accepted until 6:00 P.M Friday afternoon. This is to allow sufficient time to perform the Merit Evaluations on Saturday morning between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and Noon. Likewise, all popular vote ballots will need to be cast prior to the closing of the Show Room on Friday. All entries would be available to reclaim after completion of Merit Evaluation around Noon. All entries should be claimed by 1:30 P.M. on Saturday afternoon. Contest and Popular Vote results will be presented at the Awards Banquet on Saturday evening.

Look forward to seeing you and your entries in Mesa, Arizona.

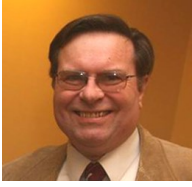

El Estrada de Ferro Oeste de Minas

30" Narrow Gauge is alive and well in Brazil!

Baldwin 30" 4-6-0 and 2-8-0 Narrow Gauge locomotives are still alive and well and in operation in Sao Joan de Rei (Saint John the King) in Brazil. This is an historic town in the southeast state of Minas Gerais is home of the Brazilian National Train Museum. This is also home of active tourist railroad the Maria Fumara (Smoking Mary) that provides a 13 KM 45 minute scenic journey through the Brazilian countryside between Sao Joan de Rei and Triadentes.

This railroad has been running continuously since inception in 1881 and operates as a heritage railway. It used to be part of a 602 KM long 30" Estrada de Ferro Oeste de Minas (EFOM) narrow gauge railroad that stretched across Minas Gerais. Majority of the railroad was abandoned in 1983 with the 13 KM between Sao Joan de Rei and Triadentes being retained to be operated as a tourist railway on weekends and holidays.

According to Wikipedia, the first two locomotives purchased by the company were from the Baldwin Locomotive Works of Philadelphia, and were described as being of the "Montezuma" type. They had a 4-4-0 wheel arrangement, and weighed about 13 tons, plus tender. Further 4-4-0's followed, and as the railway grew it also received 4-6-0's and 2-8-0's. Some of the larger locomotives were up to about 25 tons in weight. Initially the locomotives used wood

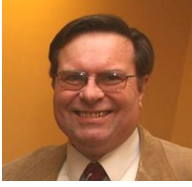
as a fuel, however later they were converted to oil. In all 58 locomotives were built for the railway. Baldwin built all but five, with three being built by American Locomotive Company (ALCo), and two in the railway's own workshops. These included the last locomotive acquired by the railway, a 2-8-0 constructed in 1920. Records indicate this locomotive was built for about half the cost of an imported locomotive from North America, but performed equally well.

Sixteen locomotives survived to the final closure of the railway, and were subsequently preserved, including 4-4-0 locomotive number 1, which is displayed in the museum. Fourteen of the locomotives are at the Museum with at least three of them in active service. I found another EFOM 4-4-0 outside frame locomotive # 20 on display in front of the AMF model railroad club in Belo Horizonte, Minas Gerais.

For On30 modelers, this is an excellent source of inspiration for modeling locomotives utilizing Bachmann's 4-4-0, 4-6-0 and 2-8-0 locomotives. Majority of the locomotives are North America built Baldwin's and most likely the possible prototypes for many of the Bachmann models.
